Welcome to all Parish Members and Visitors to Holy Rosary this weekend!

It's wonderful to have you here to celebrate the goodness of our Lord, to receive His Body and Blood in the Eucharist and to go forth doing God's will in our own lives and those we touch!

Beginning in January, the emphasis for my bulletin articles is that God makes visible the invisible. God continues to make visible the invisible in the scriptures from last week and continues through this week.

The Old Testament Scripture last Sunday is the murmuring and complaining of the Israelites frustration with Moses. And did they hammer Moses... the Israelites perceived that Moses purposely lead them to the desert to die as compared to having all the food they could eat in Egypt as slaves, while reclining near their fleshpots. Yet for before fleeing to the desert the Israelites murmur and complained for 400 years having to be slaves for the Egyptians.

The Gospel Reading of last Sunday, Jesus multiplied the loaves and fishes so the large crowd could eat... afterwards, Jesus and Disciples crossed the Sea of Galilee to Capernaum, soon after the same large crowd found Jesus to ask when He arrived. The crowd wanted more food, like they received days before. Also the crowd asks for a sign or a miracle.

The Old Testament Scripture today is more dire than the Israelites. Elijah prays to the Lord, "This is enough, O Lord! Take my life, for I am no better than my fathers." Elijah had killed the prophets of Baal, the god of rain who the Israelites considered a god equal to the Lord. Elijah's actions to kill Baal has him running from those that want to kill him now, in distress after a day on the run, Elijah asked the Lord to take his life.

The Gospel of today, includes more murmuring from His followers. Jesus is speaking truth and life... "I am the bread that came down from heaven." Yet the followers are thinking as humans think... "Is this not Jesus, the son of Joseph? Do we not know his father and mother? Then how can he say, 'I have come down from heaven'?"

Each reading, God is present to fulfill their needs. Israelites wanted out of Egypt, God did that. Israelites were about to die from hunger, God satisfied them. Elijah did God's work, yet he went running to be greeted by God's Angel giving him strength to carry on, rather than die. Jesus travels across the sea, soon the large crowd arrives for more food and to witness a sign, Jesus says to them, "I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me will never hunger, and whoever believes in me will never thirst." Jesus also said "Do not work for food that perishes but for the food that endures for eternal life." Jesus reinforces the message with those questioning his Divinity, "Amen, amen, I say to you, whoever believes has eternal life. I am the bread of life. Your ancestors ate the manna in the desert, but they died; this is the bread that comes down from heaven so that one may eat it and not die. I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world."

I reflect on my own life, you could call me an Israelite, an opportunistic member of the large crowd, waiting for the handout, or Elijah running for my life or a fool that thinks as humans do. Each of the scripture readings shine a spot light on our selfishness, looking out for "Number 1," only trying to satisfy our immediate needs of hunger, wanting to escape from our situation, placing blame on another, or being hard headed. Rather, God knows our needs, yet how often do we think we are on our own? God is made visible in the invisible, yet we are sometimes not satisfied when we need to be sounding praises of gratitude to God. The cliché "be careful for what you ask for" applies to the scripture readings. Real faith in action is the opposite action of the characters in these readings. God is asking for us to surrender.... Surrender our own wants and needs for God's plan to work in our lives. God is making visible the invisible. But will we recognize the blessings bestowed upon us?
