The Sign of the Cross and Greeting: "I through the greatness of your love have access to your house. I bow down before your holy temple, filled with awe" (Ps 5:8). After having entered the sanctuary, the priest and ministers reverence the altar with a profound bow. The priest and deacon then kiss the altar and, on solemn occasions, incense it together with the cross.

Then, standing at the chair, the priest, together with the people, makes the Sign of the Cross. The priest alone chants or says, "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." The assembly answers with the first "Amen" of the Mass: a seal of assent, a confession of faith, an expression of joy.

The Greeting of the priest follows. In greeting the assembly the priest acknowledges the presence of Christ in the midst of the Church. At the same time, the Greeting of the priest is a communication of the grace of Christ, the love of the Father, and the communion of the Holy Spirit. In responding to his Greeting, the people acknowledge the presence of Crist in the person of the priest who stands before them. "The Lord be with you. And with your Spirit."

19th Sunday Ordinary Time Greetings,

When we call ourselves "Catholic" what does it mean in word and action? Are there requirements to being "Catholic"? What might be an important "rule" some chose to follow or not follow? This week I have taken an article by Annemarie Scobey and paraphrased it.

Why going to Mass is worth the effort?

Getting to Mass on Sundays feels optional to many families. Will anyone even notice? Is there a consequence? Since the early years of our church, attending Mass was never optional. Today the church teaches that attending Mass is an obligation barring a grave cause for absence (e.g., illness). But why? Shouldn't we go to Mass because we want to, not because we have to?

**Our one constant**: Weekly Mass grounds a family. Going to Mass every Sunday, no matter what, reminds us that amid all of the uncertainties of life, we give praise and thank God for all the gifts we have been given.

**Discipline:** When we believe something is beneficial to us, we do it often. Going to Mass each week requires discipline. We may not know exactly the problems we are preventing by spending time listening to God's Word and receiving the Eucharist each week. Mass is not a self-centered event. It's about praising God and taking part in the meal that reminds us of who we are: The Body of Christ. That gives us new energy, nudges us toward becoming a better version of ourselves.

Our gift to our community: Every week we show up at Mass is a week that we say to our community, "We believe". Faith can be contagious. When I see parents with kids younger than mine at Mass, I think to myself—if they can do it, so can I. That inspires me to keep coming.

A great mission: Older children are searching for a guiding principle, a mission worthy of their lives. The church has such a mission for them, to make the world a better place, a place more like the way God would have things. We need a community to accompany us and send us forth, which is exactly what the mass does each week.

How does a family pull off weekly Mass? Simple: No exceptions. Families that make it to Mass each Sunday often don't ever consider making an exception unless someone is seriously ill. "We will find a Mass wherever our kids are playing sports." Grave cause: When you think you have a reason not to go to Mass, ask yourself, "Is this a grave cause?"

Spiritual health: Keep focused on building the spiritual health of your family in the same way you're focused on physical health.

On August 9<sup>th</sup> we celebrated the feast day of St Teresa Benedicta of the Cross also known as Edith Stien. She was born of Jewish parents and became a convert to the Catholic Faith. She was a great writer and was put to death in the Jewish camp at Auschwitz. I was reflecting on one of her writings entitled: The First Hour of Your Morning...

"The duties and cares of the day crowd about us when we awake each day - if they have not already dispelled our night's rest. How can everything be accommodated in one day? When will I do this, when that? How will it all be accomplished? Thus agitated, we are tempted to run and rush. And so, we must take the reins in hand and remind ourselves, let go of your plans. The first hour of your morning belongs to God. Tackle the day's work that *He* charges you with, and He will give you the power to accomplish it."

I know it is hard to adjust our lives to make time for God...but I also know from personal experience that when we offer our day to God... **IT JUST GOES BETTER**. If an hour is too hard, start with just 5 minutes. It could be the time you set aside to brush your teeth. From the moment you touch the toothpaste until you rinse the brush, make that a time of prayer...

One more thought on prayer time—Families that pray together fight less, love more and are more social. Try it and see if that is not true.

When early Christians looked for advice they turned to a text, parts of which constitute the oldest surviving written catechism. Written in the first century it was also called the Teaching of the Twelve Apostles. We know it as the Didache...here is some wisdom from it:

"My child, flee from all evil and from everything resembling it. Do not get angry, for anger leads to murder. My child, do not grumble, for this leads to blasphemy; be gentle-minded, for those of a gentle mind shall possess the earth. Be patient and have a loving heart. Do not be one who stretches out his hands to receive but closes them when it comes to giving. If you have earned something by the work of your hands, pass it on as a ransom for your sins. Do not turn away from those who are in need but share all things in common with your brother. Your heart shall not cling to the high and mighty but turn to the good and humble folk. Accept as good whatever happens to you or affects you, knowing that nothing happens without God."

As I read this, I can see the basis for many of our teachings we hold dear today After all, our foundation is based on the teachings of Jesus handed on through the Apostles. How many of the things mentioned in that short paragraph can we do willingly today? **This bears repeating**: Families that pray together fight less, love more and are more social... try it and see if that is not true.
