The Liturgy of the Eucharist

"I received from the Lord what I also delivered to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body which is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way also the cup, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me" (1 Corinthians 12:23-25). The Mass is the Sacrifice of Christ and the Banquet of his Body and Blood. It is the mystery of Christ's Cross and Resurrection made present in our "here and now," the foretaste on earth of "what God has prepared for those who love him" (1 Corinthians 2:9) at the heavenly "Supper of the Lamb" (Revelation 19:9). The Liturgy of the Eucharist unfolds in three movements: the Preparation of the Gifts, the Eucharistic Prayer, and the breaking of the Eucharistic Bread to be given in Holy Communion. The Mass thus corresponds precisely to the words and actions of Christ: "When he was at table with them, he took the bread and blessed, and broke it, and gave it to them" (Luke 24:30).



A Letter from Father Chuck

Greetings on the 32nd Sunday of Ordinary Time,

Thirty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

We are getting close to the end of the church liturgical year. The preparation for the end time is heavy in our readings at Mass. Easter was in early April.... Many went to reconciliation during Lent, it may be time to come to this great sacrament again.

When I receive anonymous letters, I normally shred them. It takes courage to sign a letter and stand up for what you want to express. Also it is hard to have a conversation and correct any misconceptions when the writer of the anonymous letter only wants to have their side of the story or their solution heard. I received an anonymous letter regarding reconciliation. Here it is.

Dear Fr. Chuck,

As you perhaps realize, "going to confession" is very stressful, especially for older Catholics who were used to going in secret rather than "face to face" like now. Several years ago, in my old parish we had a priest come to present a week-long mission. In fact he was there two different years, and both years on the final day of the mission he and our priest, "heard" peoples confession in a totally different way. The person would write (on a small piece of paper) how long it had been since their last confession, along with their sins. There were two lines of people in the center of the church who would show their sins to the priest. Who would look or glance at the paper and then give their penance and absolution. The person would then drop the paper into a metal can that had a small flame burning to burn the paper. Those who had not gone to confession for a long time liked this way to get back to the sacraments. Maybe you would consider this method. It would be worth it if it would get even a few back to the sacraments. You could mention it on Sundays so they could think about it before the penance service.

I will acknowledge that going to Confession can be stressful (for the penitent) ...however I find that most priests are very helpful and that in reality after going to confession 99% of penitents would say it is stress relieving. In our confessional a screen is provided to allow for confession in secret. Personal experience says approx. 5% of the people use this method. It may also surprise you to know that some come to confession with their sins on a piece of paper and they read them. Then I burn them afterwards.

A root cause of sin is pride. It takes an act of humility to offset the pride or selfishness that caused us to sin. It is humbling to tell a priest that we have made a major mistake. It is also healing to have someone listen with a compassionate ear and then impart God's mercy and forgiveness in a way that can be felt and heard.

I am going to borrow a response from Archbishop Forte: On the question: "Why must one confess one's sins to a priest and not do so directly to God?"

"Of course, one always addresses God when confessing one's sins," begins the archbishop. "That it is necessary to do so before a priest is something that God himself makes us understand."

"When sending his Son in our flesh," the prelate continues, "he shows that he wants to meet with us through direct contact, which passes through the signs and language of our human condition."

"As he came out of himself for love of us and came to 'touch' us with his flesh," he adds, "so we are called to come out of ourselves, out of love for him, and to go with humility and faith to the one who can give us forgiveness in his name, with word and gesture," namely, "to whom the Lord has chosen and sent as minister of forgiveness."

"Confession is therefore an encounter with divine forgiveness, which Jesus offers us and is transmitted to us through the ministry of the Church," writes Archbishop Forte. "Approach confession with a humble and contrite heart and live it with faith," he urges. "It will change your life and give you peace of heart."

If it has been a while since you have been to confession do not let fear keep you away. "Peace" is one of the gifts we are given through reconciliation. The one on one aspect of reconciliation is important. But the most important is that God's mercy is given to us and we are freed from sin. God's grace will help us on our journey. We are better able to avoid future sin.

I clear my schedule to fit in a private time for reconciliation if someone does not want to come when others are around. Do not let sin keep you from getting closer to God...

Jesus loves you and so do I, Blessings, Fr. Chuck
