The Holy Father's Prayer Intention

When adding someone to the prayer list please ask for their permission to do so, and We pray for the Holy Father; as he fulfills his mission, may he continue to accompany the flock entrusted to him, with the help of the Holy Spirit.

The Prayer of the Faithful

"First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all men, for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life, godly and respectable in every way" (1 Timothy 2:1-2). The Prayer of the Faithful, also called the General Intercessions, is a litany of supplication for the Church, for civil authorities, for those afflicted by suffering, and for he local community. It concludes the Liturgy of the Word. In the Prayer of the Faithful the Word heard in the readings, explained in the homily, and meditated in silence becomes the Word prayed. "So shall my word be that goes forth from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty" (Isaiah 55:11). The priest directs the Prayer of the Faithful from the chair; taking care to relate it to the Word that has been proclaimed and preached, he begins it with a brief invitation and concludes it with a prayer. A deacon, cantor, or lector announces the intentions. "The intentions announced should be sober, be composed freely but prudently, and be succinct" (GIRM, art. 71). The people make supplication after each intention by singing or reciting an invocation or by praying in silence.




Welcome to the 31st Sunday of Ordinary Time!

What takes place four weeks from the 31st Sunday of Ordinary Time? You guessed it... the beginning of the New Church Year, with the First Sunday of Advent on December 3rd.

Usually, the beginning of the new calendar year is on January 1st. We make resolutions to drop some weight, exercise more, eat healthier, spend more time with people you love, and the list goes on.

This year, beginning December 3rd, consider the beginning of the new Church Year as one of those times to further your relationship with Jesus. Rather than making a resolution, consider persevering a closer relationship with Jesus. Persevering is different than a resolution.



Persevering, described from the Council of Trent in the year 1547, calls perseverance "a great gift" and says that those in the state of grace cannot persist in God's friendship without special divine aid (Denzinger 1572).

Sarah Coffey, Arch Diocese St. Louis writes, "Looking at this definition (of perseverance) through a Catholic lens, that "something" we're doing is living our call in the world, pursuing God's will — or trying to."

You may see that, "perseverance" within our Catholic tradition is much different than our society describes. Our society may say, "Pull yourself up by your bootstraps," or "cowboy up." This understanding of perseverance is based on the person's individual will.

Deciding to persevere within the Catholic tradition includes leaning on the Holy Spirit and asking the Holy Spirit for strength to persevere. We ask the Holy Spirit to partake in the journey, providing guidance through the Gifts of the Holy Spirit: Wisdom, Understanding, Counsel, Fortitude, Knowledge, Piety and Fear of the Lord that we have all received. These Gifts were given to us at baptism and fully received at confirmation for us to unwrap. We are on this earthly journey with the help of the Holy Spirit through these Gifts.

Deciding to persevere, rather than make a resolution, firmly results in success or failure. To persevere in doing God's will allows us to recognize that the journey of our earthly life is not fully based on our actions to "cowboy up" or determination. Rather, to persevere is in cooperation with God's plan during our earthly journey. This may mean that going backwards is a learning experience that God purposely allowed us to navigate with Him. That is the "great gift," the "divine aid", as quoted from the Council of Trent.

There are many ways to persevere with God's help. An increased prayer life through scripture reading; finding a devotional resource: attending adoration; having greater patience with someone; forgiving yourself, because God has already forgiven you; recognizing that God has a timeline, but it is not based on your earthly timeline. Knowing God is with you to persevere during your (identify your situation here) provides a degree of trust, peace, love, and joy that only He can provide.

Personally, I like how Sarah Coffey wrote, "Looking at this definition (of perseverance) through a Catholic lens, that "something" we're doing is living our call in the world, pursuing God's will — or trying to." The last three words, "or trying to" allows for each of us to be a child of God, because children "try." God loves each of us and desires to be that Father to help us to continue trying... persevering.

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is coming to Holy Rosary!

Holy Rosary Parish is embarking on a new opportunity in Faith Formation for the children of our parish. Catechesis of the Good Shepherd, a program of Catholic spiritual (faith) formation for children ages 3-11, is in the beginning stages of development. It is our goal to begin offering this program for children ages 3-6 years old in the fall of 2024 or in the fall of 2025. The times and days when CGS will be offered at Holy Rosary have yet to be determined.

Inspired by the Montessori principles of education, CGS is grounded in prayer, Scripture and Liturgy and consists of three levels of spiritual formation for children: Level 1 (ages 3-6), Level 2 (ages 6-9) and Level 3 (ages 9-11). Encouraged by the success stories from other parishes in and outside of our diocese, we are excited to bring CGS to Holy Rosary by starting a Level 1 program.

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd does not use the typical classroom model for religious education. Instead, children learn in a prepared environment called an atrium. The atrium that we are developing for 3-6-year-old children will be in the small room located within the youth room in the basement of the church (underneath the sacristy/chapel area). The following is a brief explanation about the CGS atrium from the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd website:

The atrium (or prepared environment) is one of the important elements that helps the relationship between God and the child to flourish. After a theme has been presented (by the catechist), the child is free to choose an activity that will make possible the inner dialogue with the Holy Spirit. In a traditional classroom, the primary relationship is thought to be between the teacher and the child. (Maria) Montessori noted a third important, but often silent partner in education: the environment. She discovered that the environment doesn't have to remain an invisible partner, but rather can be intentionally shaped. The environment itself is a teacher; in fact, the children learn more from interaction with the environment than from direct instruction from a teacher. (cgsusa.org)



Part of the beauty of a CGS atrium is that most of the materials used by the children in their formation are made using the time and talents of parishioners. The following is a brief explanation about some of the materials that are used in the Level 1 atrium:



The materials in the atrium are often three dimensional wood representations of a particular scripture or are items that represent what can be found in Baptism or Eucharist. They are attractively displayed and invite the children to explore and deepen their experience of the presentation (by the catechist) at their own rhythm. The most important characteristic of the materials is their close link to the Biblical and liturgical sources. The shelves (in the atrium) might include maps of Israel and miniature environments representing the elements of the parables or the historical events from the infancy or paschal narratives (of Jesus) that have been shown to satisfy the spiritual needs of the child. The model altar and its articles convey the centrality of the Eucharist. The Baptismal font and other liturgical items initiate the child into the liturgical life of the church. (cgsusa.org)

As we work to create and develop the atrium at Holy Rosary, we are looking for wood workers, seamstresses and artists (teen and adult) to make some of the materials that the children will use. These materials allow the child to receive and respond to God's love during their time in the atrium. We are also looking for items that will beautify the atrium such as rugs (4x6 & 5x7), low shelves, coffee tables, small tables, child size chairs, and small table lamps. If you are interested in making materials for the atrium or if you have any of the above items that you could donate to the atrium, contact Kathy Olson: 218-847-1393; kaolson@holyrosarycc.org.
