A Letter from Father Chuck Huck

Easter Greetings,

Alleluia! Jesus has risen! Alleluia!

Alleluia! It is time to use the "A" word. The challenge is to use it for the next 8 days. In the stores, on the street, at home. We now work to keep the accomplishments of our Lenten journey alive through our celebration of Pentecost in 50 days...

Alleluia! We are talented and giving people. I am filled with great appreciation for the many gifts God has given the members of our parish community: musicians, singers, lectors, ushers, gift-bearers, adorers, servers, Eucharistic Ministers, sacristans, art and environment. Your willingness to serve others in the various liturgical roles is an example of a Christian community in action. We become just like the communities of prayer mentioned in the Acts of the Apostles. Thank you for your attendance and assistance in bringing Gods work to life through full and active participation.

Alleluia! Divine Mercy Sunday is next weekend. Reconciliation, Prayer, and Adoration are part of the celebration. Please join in the celebration. Plenary Indulgences are available.

Alleluia! We share weekly in the reception of Holy Communion. Soon our youth will celebrate their First Holy Communion and Confirmation. Keep them in prayer.

#### The Communion of Empty hands

#### Eduardo Galeano

Though he was an atheist, the Uruguayan writer Eduardo Galeano (1940-2015) knew several pastors and lay Christians who were imprisoned by his country's authoritarian government in the 1970's and '80s. This story is based on their accounts.

Nineteen seventy-three. Montevideo, Ninth Cavalry barracks. A rotten night. Roar of trucks and machine-gun fire, prisoners facedown on the floor, hands behind their heads, a gun at every back shouts, kicks, rifle blows, threats...

In the morning, one of the prisoners who hadn't yet lost track of the calendar recalled, "Today is Easter Sunday."

#### Gatherings were not allowed

But they pulled it off. In the middle of the yard, they came together.

The non-Christians helped. Several of them kept an eve on the barred gates and an ear out for the guards' footsteps. Others walked about, forming a human ring around the celebrants.

Miguel Brun whispered a few words. He evoked the resurrection of Jesus, which promised redemption for all captives. Jesus had been persecuted, jailed, tormented, and murdered, but one Sunday, a Sunday like this one, he made the walls creak and crumble so there would be freedom in every prison and company in every solitude.

The prisoners had nothing. No bread, no wine, not even cups. It was a communion of empty hands.

Miguel made an offering to the one who had offered himself. "Eat," he whispered. "This is his body."


And the Christians raised their hands to their lips and ate the invisible bread.

"Drink. This is his blood."

And they raised the nonexistent cup and drank the invisible wine.

### **Purgatory Clock Information**

The Sunday after Easter is called Divine Mercy Sunday! We know God is merciful and wants all His children with Him in Heaven. Divine Mercy Sunday is a day in which you can be granted a Plenary Indulgence. This indulgence is based on the teaching that there is punishment for sin in this life and in the life to come... as an example: in this life a person may overindulge in alcohol, it can lead to relationships that are strained or broken.

That punishment is a consequence of the decision to place the use of alcohol over the personal relationships. The punishment in the next life is having to see the effects that the sin had on those around us and how our example or neglect may have caused someone close to us to follow the same path or act in anger towards another. In purgatory we see the effect of our sin on others. Purgatory is a time of purification. (Catechism Catholic Church paragraphs 1030, 1031, 1032)

We find plenary indulgences are scripturally based and it is a time when our souls are purified so that we can enter unstained into the heavenly presence. It is important to obtain the grace of a plenary indulgence when we can because this resets the timer to zero and all punishment in this life and the next are released until we do something again that warrants "time out." You are also able to "gift" your earned plenary indulgence to someone who has died. It is a good practice to obtain an indulgence at least once a year.

To acquire a plenary indulgence, for Divine Mercy, it is necessary to desire the indulgence, attend the praver service, and perform the following three conditions: sacramental confession, Eucharistic Communion, and prayer for the intention of the Pope. It is further required that all attachment to sin, even venial sin, be absent. All the conditions must be met within a period of time, usually 8 days before or after... There are other plenary indulgences available at other times... for example those who attended the Chrism Mass could have received an indulgence if they met all the requirements. I have a book with many other opportunities

for receiving a Plenary Indulgence. Feel free to ask myself or the Deacon if you would Divine Mercy Hours: Adoration 2PM - 3PM like more clarification. Reconciliation 2 PM - 4 PM Blessings on your day! Fr Chuck
