A Message From Deacon Gary

Fr. Pat Sullivan shared a homily story last Sunday regarding a family about to enter the church for Sunday Mass. The father reminded the children before opening the door, “remember who you are and the place we are about to enter.” In other words, remember that you are a member of our family and the expected behavior when entering this building. For each of us, remember you are a child of God, we are expected to behave in a manner to draw people closer to us and witness to them to have them grow closer to Jesus.

These last weeks of the Church year, the readings at Mass point to the end times, our death and our final judgement. As the father said to the children “Remember who you are and the place we are about to enter.” The Church, through the scriptures, reminds us also who we are and the place we are about to enter. That place we desire to enter after this life is heaven.

When asking high school men the question, “Who wants to be in heaven after this life?” They all raise their hands. Also, no one raises their hand if they want to be in hell after this life. My question to them, what needs to happen in your life between now and heaven? It is wonderful they give the “right” responses, though from witnessing their lives, some of the men do not appear to live out the “right” responses. The same applies in my life, I have the right responses but fail at times to live out the “right” response.

Fr. John Riccardo from ACTSXXXIX tells a story about how a professional golfer prepares for the course to win the prize. The professional golfer begins with the end in mind. Rather than beginning at the first hole tee box, looking at the course, the golfer begins at the 18th hole green and looks back up the course to the first hole tee box. For us imagine being 100 years old preparing to enter eternal life in heaven and reflecting all the way back to age 7.

The golfer looks at the 18th hole green to determine where he wants to place the ball for the best putt to the hole. Then the golfer looks about 150 yards from that spot back up the course to determine where the ball should be placed from the previous stroke, in order to assure the ball lands at the spot on the green to best make the final putt. The golfer continues work back to the 1st hole tee box assessing and analyzing the best placement of the ball for the next stroke. The golfer also keeps in mind those situations when the ball doesn’t land in planned spot and what the course adjustment may be needed.

Now imagine yourself at 100 years old, about to enter eternal life, what does your **faith life** look like at 80 years old, 60 years old, 40 years old, 30 years old, 20 years old... What does your **faith life** look like at each of those points in life? How about those points of course correction as a result of sin?

Remember who you are and where you are about to enter. Engage with God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit through a life in continual prayer, attending communal prayer at Mass, regular and frequent reception of the sacraments (reconciliation, eucharist) and living out the two greatest commandments, loving God and neighbor. Will this be hard... maybe, possibly, yes. Are you to journey in this life on your own... no. Maybe now is the time to land yourself on the 7th fairway of life, in preparation to make the best putt at the 7th hole, consider joining one of the Advent small groups for one day a week for 4 weeks of Advent. If the dates or times do not meet your schedule, let me know. “Remember who you are and the place we are about to enter.”
